Over the years the Siemperivums Fund has acquired land for preservation, resulting in four state parks, 35,000 redwood trees planted, 23,000 other trees planted, and 60 miles of hiking trails.

They would now like to connect the dots to finish the work of natural land preservation that others have started by acquiring additional properties, and put them all together with the existing protected parcels into one great park managed by a single organization. If this is not done soon, subdivisions will take over, and valuable natural resources will be lost.

Of course this would require a great deal of money that would need to be raised. It would also require the cooperation of the several non-profit organizations already in the area, lumber companies, and several government agencies. It would be based on a best land use plan. Lumber harvest would continue on a controlled basis.

There are approximately twenty landowners that would be involved, of which six are major landholders. There are many details to be worked out, including how the land will be acquired, who will administer the Great Park, what will be the management strategy, (a model for this situation is Yellowstone Park), and how will the park be maintained.
